'AS I REMEMBER HIM'

'Him', was the title Sir Zelman Cowan chose for his talk as guest speaker at the U3A Senior Citizens' Week Forum in the Hawthorn Town Hall in April. Sir Zelman explained that the pronoun was grammatically correct as in 'as I remember him' and went on to talk of his dreams as a boy and how they had been more than fulfilled by life.

This life took him to the 2nd World War and then to New College Oxford as a Rhodes Scholar from where he was elected to a fellowship at Oriel College (1945-50). He was eventually to return to Oriel as Provost (1982-90) after, amongst other things, a period as Vice Chancellor of Queensland University, a post he relinquished to become Governor-General of Australia (1977-82). Sir Zelman was at pains to stress that in a life full of interest and challenge, his period as Governor-General of Australia was 'very special'.

'It was the greatest experience of my life. I came to know this country in a special way'. This brought him to the issue of Republicanism and the debate which is now current. Sir Zelman expressed the view that this discussion about forelocks and such needed to be seen in its proper context. Things British had dominated the Australian way of life, but this is now corrected he believes. 'The British values we have drawn on in the past are very important', he said, and the development of Republicanism should not be seen as a rejection of those values.

'We are incontestably an independent nation and this was particularly significant during my period as Governor-General. If, instead of being Governor-General, I had been President I don't know that I would have done anything different', he said.

VIOLENCE IN THE COMMUNITY

The Annual General Meeting concluded with a talk by Mr. Christopher Arnold of the Victorian Community Council against Violence which had been formed after the Queen Street shootings. The Council produced a number of reports on family violence and sexual assaults - a first here. It is their belief that old people are not victims so often as others as their life-style protects them to a degree, as they do not go out at night or frequent hotels, and they use public transport less. On the other hand elderly people living in the inner suburbs are more at risk than elsewhere especially if they live alone.

There was general discussion on this difficult and complex subject and Mr. Arnold advised that old people pay attention to securing doors and windows, drawing blinds, etc. In his opinion the real solution to this whole question is education regarding matters of security.
