U3A CONFERENCE HELD IN ADELAIDE SEPTEMBER 1992

In our December newsletter we advised that Dr. Alex Gale was one of the speakers at the above Conference. She has given us a copy of her talk at the Conference and this can be borrowed from the office should anyone be interested in reading it. Her concluding remarks are very relevant to the thoughts and ideas behind the concept of U3A.

" I want to emphasize the need in the community for our age group to be given the opportunity of assessing where we are in our life journey, also to assess some of the belief systems which we have been functioning by, and examine if they are relevant for us now; to experience our own creativity, and flow with it; to claim our inner wisdom which has developed over the years; to be able to express and own our shame, fears and anxieties and guilt. Share feelings of aloneness, loneliness, loss and grief so these feelings are seen as an expression of our human-ness. The use of appropriate books gives a starting point and a structure for person experiences and problems to be expressed and questions to be formed.

" For a feeling of trust to be built up one needs a long term group in which an attitude of acceptance prevails and where there is a nucleus of old members to sustain this. This enables new people to slip easily into the group. We need to come to terms, accept and enjoy who we are. In this group there is a mixture of intellectual input and developing personal awareness and hence personal growth. It is not always easy for older persons to find such a group. This is something U3A can and has offered.

" One needs to be able to have choices, some prefer much more impersonal didactic approach and gain a great deal from such a group."

U3A (UK) National Travel Club

Membership of this club is open to members of U3As within the U3A Network-Victoria

The scheme works as follows. The U3A National Travel Club organises tours from the UK to several overseas destinations; these have included, for example, France, Italy, Morocco and Russia. Tours within the UK have also been in the Travel Club's program.

Such tours could be attractive to U3A members from Victoria who are planning future visits to the UK and other parts of Europe and who would like to join up with people from the UK with similar interests. The U3A Network-Victoria has successfully negotiated an arrangement which will make this possible. Members of Network U3As are able to take out membership of the U3A (UK) National Travel Club through the Network.

Members of the Travel Club receive 4 Travel Newsletters per year, setting out all currently-available tours and procedures for joining them. A copy of each newsletter is airmailed to the Network Secretariat, which then photocopies them and mails them directly to members on its list. (This is much cheaper than having them each airmailed directly from England.) The subscription for 1993 is \$10.00, which covers the UK membership fee, the costs of photocopying, stationery and mailing in Victoria and the cost of our sending a single annual bank draft for all the subscriptions collected here.

**TELELINK: AN INITIATIVE OF THE ASSOCIATION FOR THE BLIND
AND THE U3A NETWORK-VICTORIA**

The Association for the Blind has, for some time, run a "Telelink" service for its members, provided with the aid of Telecom. This enables groups of up to nine people to be put in touch with one another, simultaneously, through their home telephones. The system can equally be used to provide U3A-type activities for people who find it difficult to attend normal classes.

Following a successful pilot program held in January of this year, it has been decided to offer another, more extended program beginning in July.

There will be eight people in each activity group, four of whom will be visually handicapped people registered with the Association for the Blind.

The other four places are for U3A members who meet the following criteria:

- they find it difficult to attend normal U3A classes because of a disability of some kind or because of severe problems with transport; and
- their phone numbers are in the Melbourne (03) area.

Four activities are planned:

Music Appreciation	Mondays, 10 am, beginning 19 July
Personal Development and Self-awareness	Tuesdays, 10 am, beginning 20 July
Armchair Travel	Wednesdays, 10 am, beginning 21 July
Literature*	Wednesdays, 11 am, beginning 21 July

Each session will run for 45 minutes and the duration of each activity will be either 8 weeks or 10 weeks.

(*subject to the availability of suitable resource materials for the visually handicapped)

Full details of the program for each activity will be published shortly. At the same time the date on which registrations will open will be announced.

N.B. Funding is being provided to enable this pilot program to be a free one.

COURSE NOTES FROM DEAKIN UNIVERSITY

Distance Education courses from Deakin University provide extensive course notes. When such courses are periodically reviewed, some course notes need to be updated and often the University is left with stocks of superseded notes. Rather than pulp these, the University has agreed to offer them to the Network for distribution to U3A classes for which they may still be entirely appropriate. This process has commenced and the Network is grateful to Deakin University for this form of assistance.

"Newline" is a new information service of the AFTB which will allow people with a print handicap to access the daily newspapers via the telephone and to choose the articles they hear using telephone tone dialling.

Many volunteers will be required to read daily newspaper articles onto a computer. This will be done at the AFTB, 454 Glenferrie Road, Kooyong from 6.00am, seven days a week. Volunteers will need to be "early birds" with good reading voices and accurate pronunciation.
