## Artefacts and Arty Facts by Morris Williams

### QUOTABLE QUOTES

In the quest for information and understanding of art, it is possible to become engulfed in pages of prolix interpretations and criticisms and emerge none the wiser. Fortunately, one can also occasionally encounter pithy aphorisms giving keys to artistic movements and new viewpoints. Not surprisingly, artists are often the source of such gems of wisdom. A few examples:

Pablo Picasso once identified the inexorable power and urgency of his muses when an interviewer commented that it was incredible that one person could produce such a wealth of astonishingly varied styles and images throughout one lifetime, seemingly without even trying. Picasso answered, 'If I had *tried* they would all have looked the same', which is related to another

of his pronouncements, 'Painting is stronger than I am, it makes me do what it likes.'

Wassily Kandinsky led me to an appreciation (which I lacked) of abstract impressionist art by his disarmingly simple remark, 'A painting doesn't have to be a painting of something or about anything. It just has to be a painting.'

André Derain articulated precisely the initial impact felt on entering an exhibition of Fauvism: 'Fauvism was our ordeal by fire ... colours became charges of dynamite, they were expected to discharge light.'

And Jean-François Millet said, 'Great art speaks its own language.' Art history and art appreciation in a nutshell!

## ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2005-2006

This has been a year for U3A Hawthorn to look to the future with enthusiasm for its bright prospects and to look to the past with pride in its accomplishments. We have settled in well at our new premises at Sinclair Avenue (SAC), and it has been a great pleasure for members to attend social functions at our own premises for the very first time. In August, a week of 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations included a luncheon at which 20 year members were honoured. As you read this Newsletter, City of Boroondara contractors are completing building works and we are preparing for classes to commence at both SAC and Wakefield Street, and for the office to open at SAC. We thank the City of Boroondara for the works done to improve SAC, and for the furniture and equipment they have donated to us.

It is a measure of the hard work and dedication of our volunteers that, while accommodation and other issues are being resolved, our courses continue unaffected. Their broad range and high quality go from strength to strength. The curriculum continues to offer between 80 and 90 full and short-term courses, and members have enjoyed a Summer School full of fascinating subjects, thanks to Derek Readman and his team. We thank Swinburne University for supporting the Summer School by providing two classrooms and facilities.

Membership continues to range between 1000 and 1200 according to the time of year. Our financial position is healthy. The use of SAC represents significant savings in rental costs, and in addition we have received a grant of \$6600 from the City of Boroondara. We were also successful in obtaining other grants amounting to \$5000. This money will allow us to pay for some minor alterations not in the City's scope of works, and to purchase items needed at SAC.

This is my last report to you as President. I would like to take the opportunity to encourage every member to contribute to U3A Hawthorn in some way. In a world dominated by the lure of the dollar this wonderful organization exists only to provide learning, recreational and social opportunities to older people. It has no financial or material motivations whatsoever. It needs your involvement to continue to flourish.

I have had the great pleasure over the last three years of working with so many enthusiastic, dedicated volunteers. I would like particularly to thank Committee members and senior office staff for their unstinting support and friendship.

## U3A HAWTHORN SCHOLARS HELP AN ENGLISH ACADEMIC TO SOLVE A THREE-CENTURIES-OLD PUZZLE

In 1714 the British Government offered 20,000 pounds sterling to whoever could invent a machine which could measure Longitude at sea. We all know that in 1762 Harrison won the prize with a clock that was so accurate that on a voyage to the West Indies it lost only 5 seconds after 81 days at sea.

Less well known is that the runner-up was Tobias Mayer, an astronomer and surveyor from Göttingen. He invented an instrument that could determine Longitude by measuring the angle between the moon and a star to within 30 seconds of a degree, an accuracy unprecedented in those times.

But how did it work? That was the task facing George Huxtable, a retired physicist from Oxford with a deep interest in astronavigation. He had access to Tobias Mayer's explanatory notes to the Board of Longitude but these were in Latin. In a letter to Nigel Creese, Oxford scholar and currently Latin tutor at U3A Hawthorn, George Huxtable wrote: "While I know a lot about navigational instruments, I have no understanding of Latin. Could you help?"

Nigel Creese took the request to his U3A Latin class. Claude Miller, who hails originally from Bristol and combines an interest in languages with a fascination for all things nautical, volunteered to help. Nigel was happy to leave the lion's share of the translation to Claude, particularly the detailed redrafting and fine-tuning that occurred in an

exchange of emails during the latter part of 2004 with George Huxtable.

George was delighted with the result: "Thank you both so much for making such a wonderful translation! Having read your translation, twice now, I have become more and more impressed by your success in turning the Latin into readable

English, where the phrases fall together rather naturally, just as though Mayer had written them that way. There were many questions in my mind as to how Mayer's clever instrument worked in detail. I already knew how it worked in general terms. Your translation has made the whole thing clear."

It was this translation, 3000 words in all, that George used as the basis for his address to the XIII

Conference of the Association for the History of the Northern Seas at Flushing in August 2005. He has now been invited to speak to the Mayer fellowship at the Mayer Museum near Stuttgart this coming October. The invention is known as Mayer's Repeating Reflecting Circle.

So what exactly is it? As its name suggests, it's a calibrated brass disc, composed of three principal parts, and equipped with a movable telescope and an adjustable arm, which enables a sighting to be taken at several points around the circle and the results to be averaged. The distance of the moon from any star may be observed from a ship to within an accuracy of 30 seconds.

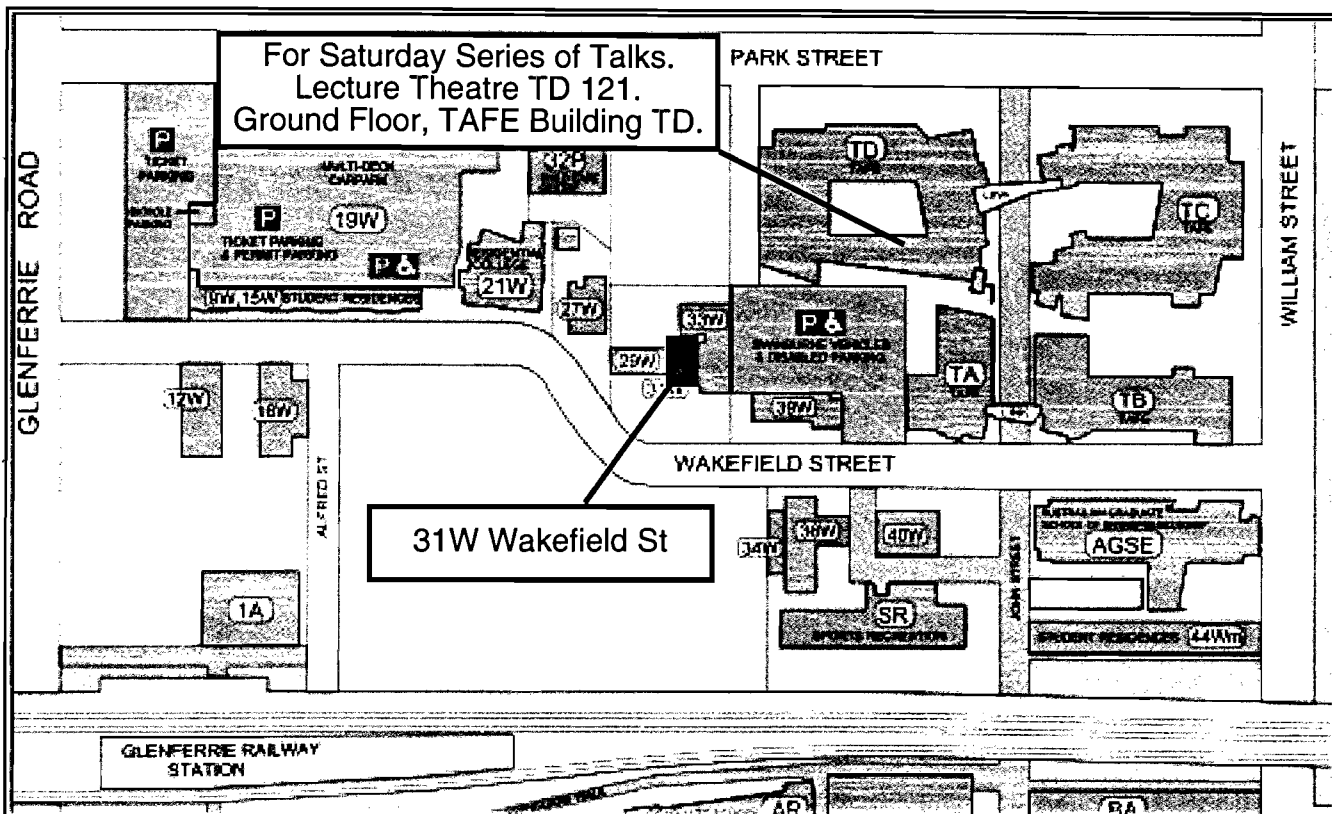
### **LEARN A MUSICAL INSTRUMENT**

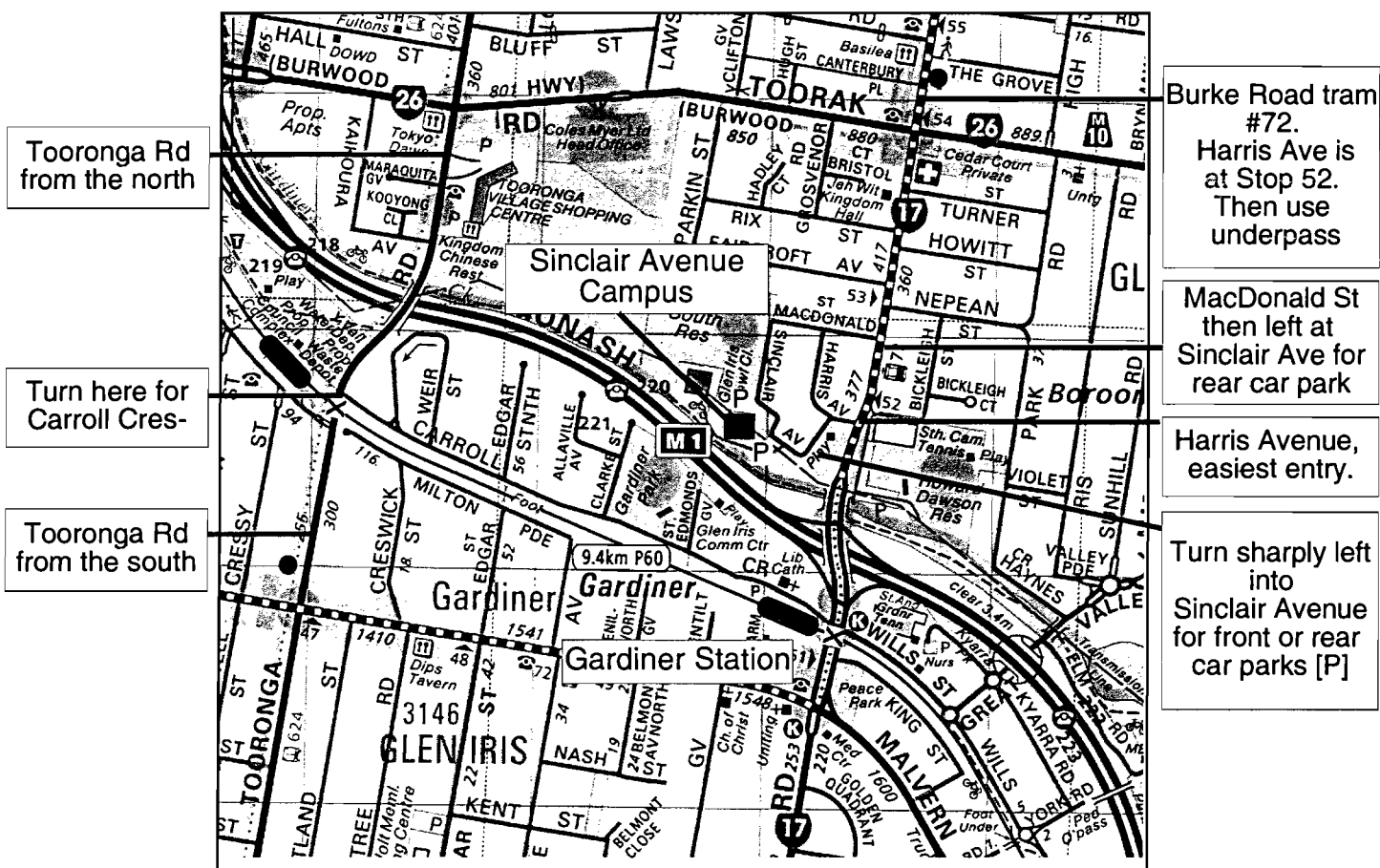
## **SUMMER SCHOOL 2006**
