## FROM THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE 2012 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

It has been an interesting experience as President of U3A Hawthorn and to see another side of this wonderful organization. In my 15 years as tutor in current affairs I was aware of some of the work undertaken, but it was not until taking on the Presidential role that I saw the breadth of activities undertaken that are necessary for the successful operation of our organisation.

In many organisations which depend on volunteers, however, there does seem to be a tendency for the work to fall to a few and I would urge all of you to consider making a contribution by volunteering in whatever capacity you feel you may be able. There is a list of possible roles on the Volunteering Form which you can download from our website and I encourage you to obtain a copy and consider where you might assist. On our part we have to improve in our response to those who do offer and to follow up in a timely fashion.

### **Thanks**

I want to say thanks to all those who have contributed to the success of our U3A over the past 12 months of my Presidency. In particular to all the members of our hardworking Committee who have worked together so well and been of great assistance to me. Unfortunately health issues have been of concern for Committee members, Gillian Yung retired from the Committee in December whilst Vice President Rod Benjamin has had a long period of hospitalisation.

Our Office volunteers have again done a sterling job undertaking the myriad tasks required to ensure the efficient administration of our organisation. Special thanks go to Gwen Gavin for her work in managing the Reception roster and to Marie Hamerton for her support of the Receptionists. Special thanks go to Prue Ferguson, our Banking Officer, who has for some years undertaken that task so patiently and effectively. Prue is retiring from the position and has recently commenced the handover of the role.

Another important group in our Office is the database team, under the leadership of Hans van Dorssen and including John Harcourt and Andrew Campbell. Several new members have recently joined the team and have rapidly familiarised themselves with the database requirements. I thank them for their willingness to assist.

I especially acknowledge the work done by our Curriculum Planning Committee under the direction of Maggie Roberts in bringing new courses and series to fruition. I also thank Joan Donlon, our Course Co-ordinator, for all the important work she has done in timetabling, liaising with Tutors and overseeing the enrolment procedures.

We can't thank our tutors highly enough for their contribution. Many have been with us for a long time and their long service is greatly appreciated. We also have some new Tutors, bringing new topics and activities to our Curriculum. We welcome them and thank them for volunteering in this important way.

There are other volunteers in our organisation whose contribution is significant; Joan Harding and her team have again put together a varied and interesting excursion program; Shirley Hallows and her gardening team have worked in rain and shine to maintain and enhance our campus gardens. Julie McNaughton has been splendid in her role as Catering Manager, whilst Janet McCombe and Brendan Hayward have worked diligently with a team of volunteers to make sure your Newsletters are prepared for posting.

I thank them all.

### **Grants**

We are again grateful to the State Government for a grant of money through U3A Network Victoria which assists us in delivering our program. I also express thanks to Boroondara Council for its financial assistance by way of a grant and by the provision of our campus here at Sinclair Avenue. Thanks to the Rotary Club of Balwyn who made available a grant for the purchase of a Document Camera for use by our tutors and guest speakers.

### **Committee Activities**

Your Committee has been hard at work this year to ensure we meet our regulatory requirements and to plan for and administer the program of courses and activities which we offer.

### **Policy Work**

It is increasingly necessary for voluntary organisations like U3A Hawthorn to have in place policies which were once the norm in business enterprises. Increasingly legislation is being passed which includes them and, if not explicitly us, clearly indicates that we have obligations to ensure a safe and risk-free environment for our members.

To this end, the Committee has been working on such policy documents as Equal Opportunity and a Code of Conduct which we hope will be finished and promoted in 2012. In addition we have sought to undertake a Risk Audit which has highlighted areas where work needs to take place on campus to reduce not only physical hazards but risks to our continued efficient operation. Special thanks to Meg Adams who has headed up this initiative.

### **Additional Classroom**

The Committee has continued to work with Boroondara Council and their consultants to review our accommodation needs, in association with U3A Deepdene. A number of site visits have been undertaken as Council establishes an inventory of locations in the district which may be suitable.

It is noteworthy that the work being undertaken by Melbourne Water to the west of our campus, involving new storm water drainage and increasing the potential flow of Gardiners Creek, promises to not only reduce the likelihood of further water inundation but also to potentially remove our campus from the designated flood zone.

### **Management Structure & Succession Planning**

Your Committee has continued to work on the management structure and has compiled detailed job descriptions for the major management positions of our Association. It is hoped that this will add clarity to these roles and also make succession planning easier as potential candidates will have a clearer view of the scope of these positions. Thanks to Claus Gyrn and Meg Adams for this work.

### **Planning Permit granted for External Sign**

Many of you will have noticed the new sign erected on our fence line but few will have realized the rather extensive effort behind the scenes. As the sign is intended to be visible from outside our campus, it required Council approval by way of the submission of a Planning Permit. Several months of work were thus involved proving title, submitting detailed maps, sign facsimiles and specifying the content and total sign area for the campus.

We were assisted in gaining an understanding of the process by our local Councillor, Coral Ross, to whom I extend our thanks and appreciation.

A submission was also made to have signage provided on street posts at the corner of Burke Road and Harris Avenue and again at the corner of Harris Avenue and Sinclair Avenue. We are grateful to Peter Dransfield of Boroondara's Traffic and Engineering Department who was very helpful and assisted us with our proposal. As you will have noticed, the signs have now been erected.

### ***Participation in U3A Network Victoria and Eastern Metropolitan Forum***

We have been ably represented at Network this year by our delegate Claus Gyrn and I thank him for his contribution in maintaining the communication with our peak body here in Victoria. Claus will not be seeking re-election in 2012 and so I take this opportunity to also thank him for his participation in and contribution to the work of the Committee.

The Eastern Metropolitan Forum is a meeting place where U3As in the eastern region get together regularly to exchange ideas, provide feedback to U3A Network and deal with common issues that confront our respective associations. Our Secretary has been our delegate throughout 2011 and has brought several issues back to the Committee for consideration.

### ***New Patron***

It was with great pleasure that Secretary Bruce Lancashire and I met with the new Vice Chancellor of Swinburne University, Professor Linda Kristjanson and asked her to become Patron of our U3A. I am delighted that she accepted the invitation and that she also expressed a willingness to seek ways in which the relationship between U3A Hawthorn and Swinburne can be strengthened.

### ***Year in Review***

It was a difficult start to 2011 and the February rains and subsequent water damage to our campus caused major disruption and delays to the start of our First Term. It also precluded us from holding a planned Tutors' Welcome.

### ***Excursions***

A varied program of excursions was provided by the Excursion Committee under the leadership of Joan Harding. These activities were well received yet again, with many being fully booked and I thank all of those involved in planning and leading them.

### ***Swinburne and Deakin Computer Labs***

We have continued to run highly popular courses in computing using the computer laboratory generously provided to us by Swinburne University. The demand for introductory and software specific courses is high and we are on the lookout for additional tutors to offer courses in this part of our curriculum.

During 2011 we were offered the use of a computer laboratory at Deakin University and despite the location being some way from our main campus, some courses in Microsoft Word were provided and gained good enrolment numbers. Staff at Deakin were extremely helpful and very considerate of the needs of our members, including arranging allocated parking. We cannot thank them enough for their contribution.

### ***Tutors' Lunch and Volunteers' Lunch***

These events in our calendar provide the opportunity to say "Thank You" to all those who volunteer in one capacity or another [and sometimes in many!]. Special thanks go to Julie McNaughton, our catering manager, who organised the lunches and to all those who assisted her in making these such successful events.

### ***Choir and Orchestra***

Our orchestra provided three concerts again under the direction of conductors Gyula [Jules] Cseszkó and Willem van der Vis. These were the last to be held in the Hawthorn Town Hall for some time as it will be closed throughout 2012.

The concerts were well attended and featured not only the talents of our own members but also some excellent soloists. I thank Ruth Muir, our orchestra convener and also her assistant Nola Meredith, for their dedication to the orchestra and the, at times, very difficult and demanding job of organising music, venues and all the myriad details required to bring these concerts to fruition.

I believe the orchestra plays a very significant part in the life of U3A Hawthorn and also assists in publicising us to a wider audience.

The Choir once again presented delightful programs. Our Choir's director of some 17 years, Judith Chipman, retired during the year and Meredith Vincent has taken up the position. I thank Judith for her significant contribution over that long period and for the contribution she has made to the standard of the U3A Choir.

### ***Carnival of Learning***

U3A Hawthorn participated again in the Carnival of Learning, traditionally the opening day to Seniors Week held at Federation Square and Birrarung Mar on the Yarra Banks. I extend thanks to the small group of volunteers including Ruth Muir and Marie Hamerton who planned and manned the U3A Hawthorn stand and John Cook and his Digital Photography classes for their displayed work.

This is a significant opportunity for us to publicise the work we do to a wider audience and I would urge all tutors to consider how they can assist in the displays, tableaux and activities featured on the day. I believe much more can be done and particularly in 2012 as this will be the 30<sup>th</sup> year of Seniors Week and I would like to see us make an all-out effort to participate in the Carnival.

### ***Summer School***

A lot of preparation and organising was undertaken in 2011 for the Summer School run in January 2012. This was again a very successful program and provided an opportunity for us to extend an invitation to our sister U3A, Deepdene, for their members to participate. A number took that opportunity and we received a lot of good feedback about the quality and interesting variety of the sessions on offer.

I would like to thank Marie Hamerton, Carol and Bruce Lancashire and all those volunteers who introduced or thanked presenters. There is a huge amount of work behind the scenes to make Summer School happen and their work certainly must be recognised.

My final thank you is to Bruce Lancashire for his sterling work as Honorary Secretary. Throughout my year as President I have relied on him to guide and direct me in the multitude of tasks required of the Office. Bruce's knowledge and attention to detail is profound and I thank him for nursing me through the year.

This is my last report as President as I am not seeking re-election in 2012. I am sure that the team which will be put together for that year will find a solid foundation on which to build, as U3A Hawthorn continues into its 28<sup>th</sup> year of operation.

## MELBOURNE WATER INFORMATION SESSION

A number of nearby residents took advantage of a presentation by Melbourne Water on the evening of 14 March 2012 - held in the U3A Main Hall from 5:30 to 7.00 pm.

Since the floods on 4 and 5 February last year, a task force in Melbourne Water has been examining possibilities for ameliorating the damage should there be another heavy rain (100 year flood) in the future. They provided a large number of maps, overhead photographs, and other data.

A number of issues were raised which will affect us including the closing of the bike path towards the city while work proceeds, a relocation of the bike path onto Coles land (it is already within that boundary), carrying out major works close to the M1 Freeway, the crossing over and excavation near a major city sewer, and the excavation and

widening of the bed of Gardiners Creek.

The Gardiners Creek bed which at present is an average of 3 metres wide at the bottom, will be widened out to 8 to 10 metres wide, over a length of perhaps 600 metres, centred mainly in the area to the south of the Coles car park.

Timing is only indicative, as there will be consultation and negotiation with a number of organisations. The project people hope to conclude these meetings by the end of January 2013, and expect that the works will take four months, without allowing for weather and other delays. Indicative cost is \$6.4 million.

One significant outcome is that the work should place the U3A premises above the flood plain for a downpour of the size we received in February 2011.

## MUSIC NOTES



The Orchestra is breathing a sigh of relief after a very successful concert on April 12 in its new venue at Genazzano College. Change of any sort always involves a degree of anxiety and uncertainty, and for such a large group there was much to plan for. The school attendants were very helpful, and apart from some problems with lighting on the huge stage, everything ran smoothly, and our large audience was delighted with our offerings. The grand Madeleine Centre is such a contrast to the dear old Hawthorn Town Hall and there was much to impress, and after the first visit we will feel more relaxed about the next one. For those of you who were not able to attend that day, it is strongly recommended that you try to be there for the next concert, as it is indeed a user-friendly venue, particularly as regards parking!

That important date is :- **Thursday, July 5 at 10.30 am**, with Willem van der Vis conducting a program of favourites, plus a seldom performed work for oboe soloist and orchestra by an early nineteenth century composer, Johann Wenzel Kalliwoda. Rehearsals will be well underway by the time you read this, and the air will be ringing with the Blue Danube Waltz, extracts from Carmen, and Eric Coates' distinctive London-based music, a nod to the Queen's Jubilee!

Our Choir has been in a similar position to the Orchestra, preparing for a concert in a new venue, and their moment of truth is close – **Saturday, June 2 at 2.30 pm**, in the Flockhart Hall of MLC,

Barkers Road Hawthorn. Meredith Vincent, the Choir's new director, tells me that they have enjoyed preparing for this event, and a special "extra" is the inclusion of a guest trombonist who will weave his magic within some of the items. Obviously a must-see for us all, and let's hope for a good attendance!

The Choir will then start preparations for taking part in an unusual event, a performance by massed choirs from U3As in the metropolitan area during Seniors Week in early October. This is planned as part of celebrations for the thirtieth anniversary of Seniors Week and again will be something not to be missed. It is hoped that members of the Orchestra will be performing at Federation Square during that time. More details of this in the next edition of the Newsletter.

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### U3A Hawthorn Summer School 2013


