



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This year has been one where our activities have been in venues that are widely dispersed across Boroondara and consequently our paths have not often crossed. Many of our members have missed that feeling of having a centre where we belong. That is all about to change as our building project is nearing completion and we will once again have Sinclair Ave as the focus for our activities.

It is expected that we will occupy our renovated premises around the end of September. We have asked Council for a short period of time between completion and our occupancy to organise and set up ready for classes and to ensure that all the new equipment is operating. One of the biggest tasks will be moving the Office and to have it operating for members as soon as possible. We expect a short period where the office will be closed so that we can organise services properly. Details of arrangements will be advertised via *Gateway* and we will ask Tutors to keep you informed.

With very few exceptions all classes will return to Sinclair Avenue. The only classes to be held at outside venues are those that have special requirements that cannot be met by the new site and those held in the Parkview Room. Those exceptions are very few in number and Tutors will have been in discussion with the Course Coordinators.

It is expected that there will be an official opening ceremony later in the year once we are settled. The date for this will be advertised as soon as it is known. This is a Council election year and the election process means that there is a pause in Council's official activities until the elections are over and the Mayor is appointed.

Some changes that will occur concurrently with the building occupation are:

New Office Software


As soon as practicable after we move we will commence the installation of a new computer software package which will up-date our processes, allow greater flexibility, quicker communication and service than is currently possible. No doubt there will be some changes and adjustments and we hope, not too many gremlins to deal with. This software is already in use at a number of other U3A's and is recommended by U3ANetwork. There will be an annual per capita charge for this software which covers back-up service and licence fees.

Cardax System

In future the buildings will be opened and closed using an electronic swipe card system similar to that in operation at the Eric Raven Reserve.

Telephone System

Our telephone system was out of date and members volunteering at Reception regularly commented that they had great difficulty hearing callers when there was background noise. We have installed a system that has more features including a better amplification range. We expect that this will make the Reception role easier.



New Furniture

After much discussion and deliberation we have purchased new chairs and tables to enable us to furnish the new classrooms. You will however find some of this furniture spread throughout all rooms. The task of finding a chair to suit all the feedback we received was indeed daunting and in fact impossible. We have made the best possible choice and have some quality furniture as a result. As this has been a quite costly exercise we hope members will look after it.

Taking care

The old buildings and the secondhand furniture perhaps did not encourage careful handling and usage of furniture and equipment. We regularly experienced significant damage to chairs, tables, audio visual/sound equipment and even walls. We would like to think that everyone will appreciate the new items and surroundings and treat them with care. We also hope the Campus Manager won't have to spend so much time repairing damaged items.

Another aspect of taking care – although we expect to move in after work is completed, it is quite likely that there will still be occasions when workmen will be present doing some small finishing tasks. Please take care to avoid their tools and equipment so that you arrive at class safely!

You will note from the above that we have and to expect to be very busy over the next few weeks. At the conclusion we will have a fresh and much more accommodating environment in which we can enjoy our classes.

We are very grateful to the Boroondara Council for this upgrade and appreciate the input from Council officers, the architect and the builder during the building period. It has been a very harmonious process with all parties cooperating to facilitate the project. The fortnightly site meetings have all been directed to keeping the project on track in a cost effective manner with much adapting and problem solving. We have been fortunate to have had such a positive experience with such an exciting and positive outcome and thank everyone one involved for a most thorough and professional approach to their work.


PARKING

Just a reminder that when our carpark is full, you can park on the eastern side of Burke Road [see map] and use the tunnel or you can park in Sinclair Ave **but only on the other side of the road from the houses**; that is - opposite the houses.

Please do not park on both sides of the road as the Council waste service vehicles and other delivery vehicles cannot access the area and residents are inconvenienced.

For those travelling north along Burke Road there is no right turn access into Bickleigh Street but you may drive to the next street up, Nepean Street and enter Bickleigh Street from the north. For those approaching from the east, consider using Great Valley Road and then Haynes Crescent, Park Road and Nepean Street to, again, enter Bickleigh Street from the north.

Due to communication misunderstandings a mini-crisis occurred when our requested booking with the Hawthorn Arts Centre suddenly fell through, and we were in a situation where we had the music, the conductor and soloist, rehearsal bookings and players at the ready, and nowhere to perform. "A bit of a worry" as they say, but after intensive emailing and phoning and re-checking we were able to secure one of our former venues, the impressive Madeleine Centre at Genazzano College, and we look forward to once again performing there and are grateful to Genazzano for making it possible.

This will all be history by the time you read this and now we are busily engaged in forward planning and arrangements for a variety of events, large and small. Rehearsals for the final concert for the year begin on 22 September. On a smaller scale we will be presenting a lunch-hour concert at Manningham U3A's campus to add to the celebrations of their 25th anniversary. For this we have formed some small ensembles from within the orchestra and will play a program of light music, some of which you may be able to hear during the formal Opening ceremony of our refurbished Campus towards the end of the year.

And on perhaps the largest-scale of all, we are busy with plans for our 20th birthday in 2017, which will be a gala event at the Hawthorn Arts Centre in mid-May, and in various ways

celebrating the history and achievements of this precious organisation.

So as you will see, including the always-enjoyable visit to St Roch's Primary School after our first concert, your Orchestra is on display far and wide and is enjoying a very busy year of fabulous music-making! "Music makes the world go round" and this year it surely needs whatever we can contribute to make this happen!

Hugh de Kretser is the Executive Director of the Human Rights Law Centre. For the past 12 years, he has worked to protect and promote human rights in Australia through his position at the HRLC and previous roles as Executive Officer of the Victorian Federation of Community Legal Centres (2007-2013) and Manager of the Brimbank Melton Community Legal Centre (2004 to 2007).

Hugh currently serves as a Director of the Victorian Sentencing Advisory Council and a member of the Advisory Boards of the University of Melbourne Law School and the McCaughey VicHealth Centre for Community Wellbeing.

Hugh was a board member of the HRLC when it was established in 2006 and held a statutory appointment as a Commissioner of the Victorian Law Reform Commission from 2008-2012. He served on the board of the National Association of Community Legal Centres from 2012-2014 and the governance committee for knowmore, the national service providing legal help for people navigating the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, from 2013-2015.

For decades, perhaps centuries, religious belief has been quarantined to the domain of the private in a way that would have been inconceivable to earlier centuries. With regard to Christianity, the principle of separation of church and state has become for many the separation of religion and society. At the same time, an apparently increasing number of people are publicly describing themselves as atheist. It is frequently not entirely clear who or what is the God that is the subject of either contemporary belief or disavowal.

This series of five presentations intends to offer a selective introduction to the legacy of philosophy and theology which has shaped the religious tradition of Western culture in order to try to understand why we think the way we do.

1. How did the idea of God first appear in Western Culture?
2. Up and down with the Philosophers – Plato, Aristotle and God
3. The Legacy of the Medieval world: the sixteenth century re-formation of the location of God.
4. The Return of the Philosophers: Descartes, Nietzsche, and the death of God
5. Where are we today? God and the naked public square.
