



As I type this brief contribution to our September Newsletter, I am reminded that Spring is in the air. Not that you would know it today, as it's only 4 degrees heading to a maximum of 12!!

On the brighter side, the sky is blue and there is no rain forecast [yet]. To many of us it has been a long cold and somewhat miserable winter. Unfortunately many members [and their families] have been infected with Covid-19; myself included. Thankfully, as we have been fully vaccinated and had access to anti-viral medication, the outcome for most has been a mild illness. Nevertheless it has required isolation, modification of activities and great care for one's own and our loved ones well-being.

It was against this background that the Management Committee weeks ago issued a strong recommendation that mask wearing should return to face-to-face classes, and that rooms be ventilated as much as practicable. From my attendance in classes and observation around campus, virtually all members are following those suggestions. I ask all members to continue with those arrangements. We have been free of lockdowns in 2022, and we want to continue that way.

It is pleasing that our music performance program has been able to go ahead in 2022. I thank each of the outstanding musical artists for their time, skill and enthusiasm. Their contributions to the musical life of U3A Hawthorn is beyond measure.

The Gateway Singers held a concert at St John's Church Camberwell in June with the theme of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee. The choir, conducted by Julie Lancashire with piano accompaniment by Roger Creed, performed music from some of the countries the Queen visited.

The Orchestra of U3A Hawthorn held a concert in August at MLC, Kew. The program "From the Old World to the New", conducted by Marie-Louise Wright, included pieces by Brahms, Bizet, Bernstein and Antonin Dvořák. A large audience of members and non-members thoroughly enjoyed this first orchestra concert for 2022.

Saturday Matinees returned to Campus on 20 August with the "Colours and Musical Arts of Vietnam", a concert arranged by members Dang and Pham Ho. This was a spectacular afternoon of colour, dress and dance displayed by a group of Vietnamese artists. An audience of about 70 people attended and enthusiastically supported our guest artists. Special thanks to Yen Bui (VSCA President), Dang and Pham for their inspired contribution to our musical repertoire.

Elsewhere in this Newsletter you will find information about the end of the year "roll-over", payment of membership fees for 2023 [\$50] and enrolment in classes for 2023 [including assisted enrolment]. I ask you to read that information carefully and to diarise the critical dates now. There will be NO PRIORITY ENROLMENTS FOR ANY CLASS, so the fact you were in a class this year does NOT mean you will automatically be in that class in 2023!! It will be 'first in, best dressed' as they say. Or as is said in the LAW: time is of the essence.

We will provide you with more detailed information later in the year via Gateways and the December Newsletter. So please READ these publications, they provide a great deal of useful information and are for the benefit of all members.

# MUSIC NOTES



## GATEWAY SINGERS

In 2022 the U3A Hawthorn Gateway Singers continued weekly face-to-face practice in the Parkview Room at the Camberwell Civic Centre in Camberwell Road. The choir currently consists of 63 members including sopranos 1 and 2, altos, tenors and basses. The choir is most ably lead by Julie Lancashire with piano accompaniment by Roger Creed.

With pandemic restrictions eased in late 2021 the choir has enjoyed performing a number of concerts over the past twelve months including a Christmas / Open Day concert in 2021 in the U3A Hall which was well attended, with a BBQ outside for attendees. Another concert was held in the U3A Hall on 30 April 2022 with afternoon tea and refreshments provided, and a mid-year concert in St John's Anglican Church, Burke Road, Camberwell in June 2022 to celebrate Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee, where a selection of songs was performed relating to some of the countries in the Commonwealth.

New members are always welcomed with the only pre-requisite being a love of singing. We sing a mixture of songs, some familiar, some with a religious background and some new to most of us. The Gateway Singers provides members with an opportunity to express our love of music, partake of a cuppa with friendly team members, and to challenge our brains as we attempt to read the music and take on the harmonies.

The choir looks forward to its forthcoming concert in conjunction with members of the U3A Box Hill/Deepdene choir, also led by Julie Lancashire. This concert will be held at 2.30pm on Sunday 2 October 2022 during Senior's Week at The Edge, Federation Square.

The Gateway Singers will end a very successful 2022 with a Christmas concert on Saturday 19 November at St John's Anglican Church Camberwell.

### ORCHESTRA OF U3A HAWTHORN

The Orchestra performed at the James Tatoulis Auditorium, MLC, on Sunday, 14 August, under the baton of Marie Louise Wright. This was their first concert with Marie-Louise, a well-known conductor of community orchestras and local musical theatre companies, and players responded well to her direction, thanking her for the work she did in preparing them for the performance.

The program, titled "From the Old World to the New", featured Dvořák's Symphony No.8. It also included Leonard Bernstein's West Side Story.

Rehearsals will begin soon for the November concert – "Stepping Out" - under the direction of David Keefe. Program details are available on the 'Next Concert' tab of the orchestra's website.

A number of players have been absent due to COVID or for other health reasons and it has been challenging maintaining the balance and strength of the orchestra in recent times.

As always, if you or someone you know, would be interested in joining the orchestra you would be made welcome. In particular, string players are always needed.

### ACOUSTIC GUITAR GROUP

The Acoustic Guitar Group commenced in August with nine members led by Peter Rogers (left). This is a welcome addition to our music performance courses. The group meets weekly at Frog Hollow. Peter had been leading acoustic guitar courses at a U3A in Sydney and we are delighted to have him join us and offer this new course. Additional members are very welcome.





The Saturday Matinee in August showcased Vietnamese traditional music instruments and dances, presented by the Vietnamese Senior Cultural Association (VSCA) and Bach Viet Dance. The VSCA seeks to maintain Vietnamese Arts and Culture and engage in traditional Vietnamese artistic performances and cultural events. It has 80 members aged 55 years plus and meets in the Ashburton Seniors Centre. The Bach Viet Dance group seeks to Inspire young Vietnamese Australians to maintain and conserve Vietnamese culture.

The musical instruments used in traditional and classical music of Vietnam comprise a wide range of string, wind, and percussion instruments, used by both the Viet (Kinh) majority as well as the nation's ethnic minorities.

# PLANNING FOR 2023

The procedures for the payment of 2023 Membership Subscription of \$50 and enrolment in courses for 2023 remain the same as in previous years.

The quickest and most efficient way to pay your subs and enrol is to log on to the Membership System at home. Payment can be made by paypal, credit or debit card or bank transfer.

You can also come to Reception for assisted enrolment, but there are likely to be queues, especially on the first day.

As in previous years, there are restrictions on number of courses which can be selected in some categories from 28 November – 4 January (eg fitness courses, art, bridge, current issues). This is to give the greatest number of people the opportunity to get into popular courses. From 4 January, people can enrol in more courses in a category if there are vacancies.

As in 2022 there will be no priority enrolments in any courses. People will be accepted into courses in order of enrolment. However for on-going language and other courses which require a certain level of proficiency, any new applicants may be contacted by the tutor to assess suitability for the level of the course.

If a course is full you will be waitlisted. Do not despair - people withdraw from courses for various reasons during the year and places are offered to those on the waitlist.

Therefore it is important to notify the office if you are not continuing with a course so that others may have the opportunity to attend. It is also a courtesy to inform the tutor/convenor of your intention to withdraw.

Members are encouraged to call at Reception at a quiet time over the next months (not during the change-over period between classes) and ask to be shown how to use the Membership system.

## COURSE OFFERINGS FOR 2023

We can only provide courses which have been offered by Member or Honorary Tutors and Convenors. We do not pay any tutors or convenors.

Therefore we do not guarantee to offer 2022 courses into 2023.

At this stage the Course Co-ordinator is working to compile the course offerings for 2023. Some of our tutors and convenors are retiring at the end of the year and therefore we need to encourage others to volunteer.

## **“Inspiration and the art of Victor Majzner”**

### **Victor Majzner**

**22READ05 Thursday 29 September 2022, 2pm, Hall**



Victor Majzner is a celebrated and acclaimed Australian artist. His work is held in public collections, including at the National Gallery of Victoria, the Heide Museum of Modern Art and the Art Gallery of New South Wales, as well as in many regional collections across Australia. He is the recipient of many art awards and has participated in numerous solo and group exhibitions.

Victor works with water colours, drawing, oils and acrylics and is inspired by a wide range of moral and ethical issues: identity, spirituality, the plight of the oppressed, the land and environmental degradation. He is part of the emerging genre of contemporary Jewish art and has ongoing connections with First Nations artists, having visited remote communities in central Australia, Arnhem Land and the Kimberley.



He was Head of Painting at the Victorian College of the Arts from 1992 to 2000; prior to that he was Head of Foundation Art at Caulfield Institute of Technology, now Monash University and then Head of Painting at Prahran Institute of Technology which became Victoria College, now Deakin University.

Victor can remember that as young as four or five years old he was holding a pencil and drawing. “Art is my life”, he said.
