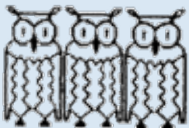

PROCEDURES FOR END OF YEAR MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL AND ENROLMENTS FOR 2024

The Membership Subscription of \$50 and process for enrolment in courses for 2024 remain the same as in previous years. To speed up your enrolment you can enrol first and then complete your payment. Please, however, complete your payment on the day you enrol.

The quickest and most efficient way to pay your subs and enrol is to log on to the Membership System at home. Payment of the \$50 annual subscription can be made by PayPal, credit or debit card or bank transfer. For bank transfers, you must include your member number and name.

You can also come to Reception for assisted enrolment, but there are likely to be queues, especially on the first day.

As in previous years, there are restrictions on the number of courses which can be selected in some categories from 4 December until 8 January (e.g. fitness courses, art, bridge, current issues). This is to give the greatest number of people the opportunity to get into popular courses. From 8 January, members can enrol in more courses in a category if there are vacancies.

As in 2023 there will be no priority enrolments in any courses. Members will be accepted into courses in order of enrolment. However, for on-going language and other courses which require a certain level of proficiency, any new applicants may be contacted by the tutor to assess suitability for the level of the course.

If a course is full you will be waitlisted. Do not despair - people withdraw from courses for various reasons during the year and places are offered to those on the waitlist. Therefore, it is important to notify the office if you are not continuing with a course so that others may have the opportunity to attend. It is also a courtesy to inform the tutor/convenor of your intention to withdraw.

Please check your courses to see that you can attend rather than signing up for courses and activities which over-commit you. We always have a big churn in January and February as people reassess their commitments. Think about it before depriving others of the opportunity to participate in a course.

Members are encouraged to call at Reception at a quiet time over the next months (not during the change-over period between classes) and ask to be shown how to use the Membership system. Receptionists are very happy to show you how to use the Membership system so that you can take advantage of the facilities it offers - enrolling, putting in absences, notifying of withdrawals, checking the status of your enrolments.

Tutors and courses for 2024

Planning is underway for the Curriculum in 2024. This is a busy time over the next few months, organising courses and tutors, timetabling and putting together the Handbook for next year.

Many of the year-long courses for 2024 have been organised already but Carol Lancashire would love to hear from people interested in offering a course or a single session or activity in 2024.

Whilst the majority of courses are included in the Handbook in November, we continue to add courses throughout the year so that there is always something new on offer.

Courses offered in 2023 will not necessarily be offered on 2024. We depend on tutors and convenors willing to offer their time and expertise. We always need new tutors and convenors.

What is the difference between a tutor and a convenor?

Tutors teach/train course participants. They are responsible for devising, researching and delivering course information and skills development over one or more sessions. They also moderate class discussion and are contact people for the course.

Convenors take responsibility for the organisation and management of a course or indoor or outdoor activity. They set the parameters for course operation and moderate class discussion and are the contact people for the course. They may organise presenters from within the course or non-members of U3A Hawthorn, introduce and thank these people and moderate question time and discussion.

A third category is the presenter. Presenters may be members or non-members who are invited by tutors/convenors/the course coordinator or members of sub committees to make a presentation to a class on a specific topic as part of a course. This may be a short 10 minute presentation in a discussion course, a full session presentation such as for the Readman series, Armchair Travel, Health series, or for a one-off event etc.

For the latter two or three, an occasional appearance at a social gathering is often to be found and provides a pleasant contrast to the larger formal events of their annual calendar.

Reflecting on my long and proud connection with the Orchestra, now preparing for their final concert for the year after their first on October 9th 1997, I remember some of the highlights we have experienced: the success of visits to local primary schools to give a lunchtime concert to those with little or no previous music education; a visit to Healesville to perform in The Memo, their wonderful concert hall; the thrill of taking the stage of the Melbourne Town Hall during the Victorian Seniors Festival in March 2003 along with massed U3A Choirs from all over Victoria, when we joined our own Choir to perform Handel's Zadok the Priest; we have also performed several times on the stage of The Edge at Federation Square at other Victorian Seniors Festivals. Several times we have had the honour to play works composed by our own players, such as Barry McKimm and David Keefe, and have had much pleasure in presenting opportunities for public performances for up-and-coming young soloists. It is a proud heritage to look back on and long may it continue! With Jaynee Russell-Clarke as Concertmaster and our team of talented and popular conductors, the future is bright.

BE CONNECTED – learning about technology

Are you worried about scams, struggling with online shopping and banking, or just need to know more about your smartphone? Well there is a government site designed to help you navigate your way through the information technology minefield. We wrote about this site a few years ago, but it's always helpful to remind members to beware of scammers and to take steps to protect your online security.

Be Connected is an Australian Government initiative to help older people gain confidence and skills in using computers, tablets and smart phones. It provides information to help people get started and so is pitched at a basic level. Money is provided to companies such as ReadyTechGo to run seminars in places like U3A and local libraries. The workshops are based around free online programs which you can also access from home to gradually work through at your own pace.

The program also provides opportunities for organisations like U3A Hawthorn to gain funding to provide technology support for members. You can help us access these grants by signing up to Be Connected.

By setting up a free account with Be Connected you can work through the units. In addition – by typing in U3A Hawthorn as your Support Centre we can apply for additional government support for U3A Hawthorn. The more people sign up with U3A Hawthorn as their Support Centre, the more access to funding support we have. We hope in the future to be able to provide assistance for our members on campus at U3A Hawthorn.

To set up an account

- On the internet type in www.beconnected.esafety.gov.au – this will take you to the site
- Click on the Join now button – this will ask you to provide some information about yourself
- Select U3A Hawthorn as your Support Centre
- Then you can start to work through the units.

“A Peculiar Language” — Early Australian English and Beyond

Edward Wakefield in his *Letter from Sydney* (1829) used the description “a peculiar language” to portray the pot-pourrie of different dialects that eventually gave rise to Australian English. This talk will look at some of the early factors that shaped this peculiar language, as well as some of the factors that are shaping it today.

Kate Burridge is Professor of Linguistics at Monash University and Fellow of both the Australian Academy of the Humanities and the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia. Her main areas of research are language change (focus on changing vocabulary and grammar), the notion of linguistic taboo, the structure and history of English, popular perceptions of language (and fall-out). She has authored / edited more than 25 books on different aspects of language. Her most recent books are: *Forbidden Words: Taboo and the censoring of language* (with Keith Allan, 2006); *Gift of the Gob: Morsels of English language history* (2010); *Wrestling with Words and Meanings* (with Réka Benczes, 2014); *Understanding Language Change* (with Alex Bergs 2018); *Introducing English Grammar* (with Kersti Börjars, 2019); *For the Love of Language* (with Tonya Stebbins 2019); *Exploring the Ecology of World Englishes in the Twenty-First Century* (with Pam Peters 2021). Kate is a regular presenter of language segments on radio and writes for *The Conversation*; she was a weekly panelist on ABC TV’s *Can We Help* (2007-11) and has given a TEDx Talk *Telling it like it isn’t* ([youtube.com/watch?v=tpCTgNyA3DY](https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=tpCTgNyA3DY)).

Admire the City Hall, banks, churches and cathedrals, a railway station, law courts, offices and more.
